

ROLLING AHEAD WITH AN EYE TO THE FUTURE

2019 was a year of changes and new opportunities for the Wisconsin Automotive & Truck Education Association (WATEA). It was also a time to reflect upon the first two decades of accomplishments in anticipation of celebrating WATEA's 20th anniversary in 2020. Thanks to our many engaged members, supportive community partners and dedicated volunteers, WATEA continues to be actively involved in supporting workforce development initiatives across central Wisconsin and beyond.

WATEA is now more than halfway through its three-year strategic plan and the results are looking positive. More than 28% of WATEA's memberships in 2019 were from new members. We have already met our goal to increase scholarship awards for students pursuing degrees in the transportation industry by 50%. The Wheels to Work goal of increasing mobility for low-income families needing access to employment received a boost with the launch of the Commute2Careers employment transit program. In summer 2019, WATEA began working with the Wisconsin Department of Workforce Development to create a new Registered Apprenticeship program for the Transportation industry, which will help achieve our Training and Workforce Development goal of creating new training opportunities and increasing employee attraction and retention. As WATEA heads into the final year of its strategic plan, the groundwork is in place for us to meet or surpass all the goals first identified back in 2017.

The Wheels to Work program continues to make a difference and change lives across Marathon County. In 2019, nine low-income households received a refurbished vehicle thanks to the generosity of our many donors who provide the program with vehicles to be repaired and repurposed. In addition, 12 more clients received an interest-free affordable loan to repair their personal vehicles, enabling them to maintain employment while improving the safety and reliability of their transportation. The WATEA Board continues to view this program as a key asset and is developing plans for increasing the number of loans, donors, and community partners heading into 2020.

Another exciting development in 2019 was the launch of the Commute2Careers employment shuttle program. This pilot program was funded through a Wisconsin Department of Workforce Development grant. Its goal is to increase access

to employment via a regional transportation shuttle system. In June 2019, the first phase of the C2C program began. Individuals working at Crystal Finishing Systems and Kolbe & Kolbe whose primary employment barrier was a lack of reliable transportation were able to apply to receive rides for up to 3 months. By the end of 2019, the C2C shuttle had assisted 20 different individuals in Wausau and Antigo with getting rides to work. The program will be expanding in 2020 to serve additional employers and employees across central and northern Wisconsin

Looking ahead to 2020, we envision even more great things. Continued development of the Registered Apprenticeship program, expansion of Commute2Careers, and a reinvigoration of the Wheels to Work initiative are just the beginning. In late 2019, the first steps were taken to develop a new educational pathway for K12 students passionate about pursuing careers in the transportation industry. WATEA will be leading a collaboration between local K12 school districts, technical colleges, and business partners to facilitate a regional educational pathway program that gets students engaged early and trained efficiently in the skills necessary to be a proficient part of our workforce faster than ever. We are going to show them what a Cool Career looks like!

Thank you for your continued support of WATEA. We work hard to ensure your investment in this organization provides your business and our economy with positive outcomes. 

STRATEGIC PLAN 2018-2020

Approved by majority vote of the Board of Directors, December 19th, 2017

BACKGROUND

Wisconsin Automotive & Truck Education Association was incorporated in 2000 to support transportation industry initiatives in Central Wisconsin. Initially created to support local school districts with their automotive programs and recruitment of automotive technicians, WATEA has grown to encompass a greater portion of the transportation industry. Membership now includes car dealerships, independent repair facilities, collision repair, diesel repair, diesel sales, local trucking companies, and local technical colleges and school districts. This growth has seen a broadening of our programs to support a more diverse membership.

PROGRAMS AND SERVICES

WATEA has five main components that drive our mission:

- **LEGISLATIVE:** Informing members of current legislative developments.
- **TRAINING AND WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT:** Create training opportunities for incumbent employees and searching out ways to increase employee attraction and retention for employers.
- **SCHOLARSHIPS:** Providing annual scholarships to individuals interested in a career in the transportation industry
- **MEMBERSHIP:** Create a diverse membership and board of directors of transportation industry businesses to support organizational mission and goals.
- WHEELS TO WORK: Create opportunities for hands-on experience for students and new employees by allowing them to work on donated vehicles while increasing the mobility of low-income families in our area.

- Increase member awareness of legislative developments

TRAINING AND WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT:

- Utilize membership data to create new training opportunities for incumbent workers

SCHOLARSHIPS:

- Increase membership by 10% annually

- Strengthen long-term sustainability of program
- Increase current program to include Demand Response Transit Service

WATEA'S WHEELS TO WORK PROGRAM: ELIMINATING THE TRANSPORTATION BARRIER

Launched in 2011, the Wheels to Work program helps low-income individuals and families by eliminating the barrier of unreliable transportation to and from work or school to promote family-sustaining employment & independence. Participants can choose to apply for a:

- 0% interest loan to pay for repairs on their own vehicle
- 0% interest Job Access loan to receive a donated vehicle

Wheels to Work is an integrated community partnership model. Participants entering the Wheels to Work program take part in the Money Smart or Get \$mart Wausau programs made available with our partnerships in the financial community. They receive individualized training in financial management, budgeting, and also receive education in vehicle maintenance. Wheels to Work engages businesses and schools to develop opportunities for valuable hands-on training, education, and experience for the apprentice and student technicians in the automotive industry.

This collaborative program incorporates the business community, the provider network, our educational partners, and philanthropic organizations and individuals like you to accomplish this goal. No one group can do this alone. Won't you consider how you or your organization can assist us today?
